

# THE SALTERS' COMPANY – A TIMELINE



1216: The oldest document in the Salters' archives refers to land in Bread Street on which the earliest Salters' Hall was later located



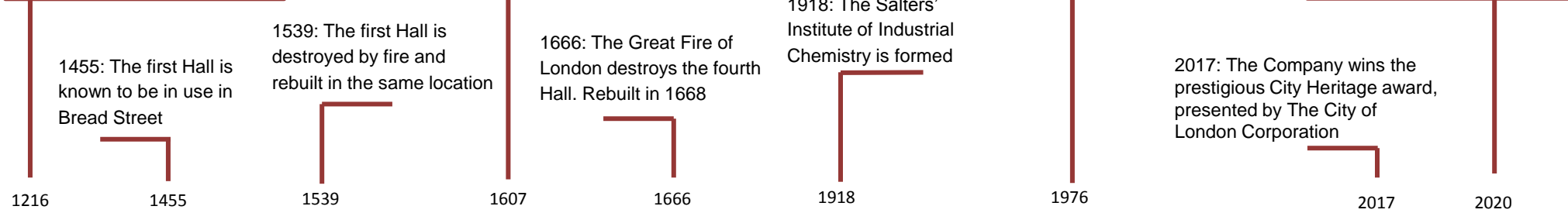
1607: King James I gives Charter to the Salters' Company



1976: The seventh (and current) Hall is opened by HRH Duke of Kent



The space around the Hall is now being developed into the largest open landscaped area in the City of London



1455: The first Hall is known to be in use in Bread Street

1539: The first Hall is destroyed by fire and rebuilt in the same location

1666: The Great Fire of London destroys the fourth Hall. Rebuilt in 1668

1918: The Salters' Institute of Industrial Chemistry is formed

1976: The seventh (and current) Hall is opened by HRH Duke of Kent

2017: The Company wins the prestigious City Heritage award, presented by The City of London Corporation

1394: King Richard II grants the Salters' Company a Licence to trade

1598: The second Hall is destroyed by fire and rebuilt in the same location

1821: The Hall is completely redeveloped to better service the Company's needs

1941: The sixth Hall is bombed on the night of 10th May 1941

2010: Salters' Hall is Grade II listed (18th November 2010)

2013: Redevelopment of the Hall takes place (2013 – 16)

1515/16: Established as ninth in the Order of Precedence of the Great Twelve Livery Companies



1645: The Salters' Company moves to a larger Hall, converted from a house on St Swithin's Lane



1941: The sixth Hall is bombed on the night of 10th May 1941



2013: Redevelopment of the Hall takes place (2013 – 16)
